#### INTRODUCTION TO THE ONI 201 SERIES Warships of the British Commonwealth

DEGLASSIFIED

THIS new manual is composed of a series of separate booklets, each fully covering a major warship category. Together with the cross-references found in the 201 Index, these booklets present the most complete survey of British Commonwealth naval vessels ever published by the U. S. Navy.

Combined with the ONI 54 Series on U. S. Naval Vessels and ONI 41–42, Japanese Naval Vessels, this new Series provides a full coverage on all the principal navies still engaged in combat in the Pacific theater.

Only by the closest cooperation of the Admiralty, Air Ministry, and Dominion Naval offices was this undertaking possible in its present complete form. All photography and drawings were made available through the offices of the Director of Torpedo and Staff Duties, the Admiralty, and represent the up-to-date appearance of all warships.

The ONI 201 Series of booklets replaces the existing publication which should be destroyed by burning.

This section of the 201 Series makes it possible to identify any British warship by name, visual call sign, or appearance. In this booklet—

Lists of the navies of the continental United Nations are included for two reasons; first, these navies operate with the British, and second, many of their fleet units are British-built ships on loan to these governments.

Separate and complete lists of the Dominion navies' warships provide reference guides.

An alphabetical index and a list of warships by pendant numbers serves as an accurate cross-reference between the categorical booklets.

A representative cross-section of types shown in silhouette charts gives an abbreviated visual summary of the entire fleet.

## ONI 201-I

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#### A SURVEY OF BRITISH WARSHIPS

Britain's warships are characterized by simple, rugged construction, embodying a judicious balance between offensive power, structural strength, seaworthiness, protection, speed, and endurance. British naval designers have striven to produce useful and reliable fighting ships within moderate limits of size and cost. They have refused to follow certain other navies in evolving spectacular "wonder ships," whose paper characteristics and architectural beauty have excelled their performance under active service conditions. During this war, British warships have given a good account of themselves, reflecting great credit on those who built and manned them.

#### CAPITAL SHIPS

Most of Britain's capital ships are veterans of the First World War. Though modernized to varying degrees, many of them have passed their prime. Nevertheless, they have been repeatedly called upon since 1939 to accomplish tasks, which under more normal circumstances would have been assigned to post naval-treaty units. Queen Elizabeth, Valiant, and Renown are probably the most effective of this older group. The 17-year-old Nelson and Rodney mark a transition in capital ship development. Despite their age, however, they must still be reckoned as very effective ships. First of Britain's modern fast battleships are the King George V and her sisters. Designed within the rigid 35,000-ton treaty displacement limit, 14-inch guns, of a new and powerful model, and quadruple turrets were accepted in order to gain weight for the requisite armor protection and speed. Their basic superstructure arrangement will probably be followed in future British capital ships.

#### AIRCRAFT CARRIERS

The British aircraft carrier force has suffered severely in this war. Furious is the sole surviving pre-war fleet carrier, and verges on the obsolete. An entirely new line of fleet carriers was started with the Ark Royal (lost in 1941) and carried on through the Illustrious, Indomitable and Implacable classes. The Unicorn, though rated an aircraft repair ship, appears to be the prototype for future light fleet carriers, the British equivalents to the American Independence design. While the bulk of the escort carrier force is American designed and built, the few existing British conversions reflect the same outboard design trends observed in the regular carriers.

#### CRUISERS

Recent British cruiser development appears to have crystallized in two basic groups, the medium to large 6-inch-gun cruiser and the dual-purpose main battery small cruiser. Older units represent the vicissitudes of the naval treaty era and the First World War. While the 8-inch-gun units may be retained for some time yet, they have not been duplicated to date.

All older cruisers will probably disappear from the active list with the return of peace, as most of them were fairly well worn out prior to 1939.

#### DESTROYERS


As in the case of cruisers, the British appear to have decided upon two sizes for their new fleet destroyers—the large "Battle" and the medium *Caesar* Classes. In the previous large group of destroyers classes, completed since 1938, the same contrast can be found in the "Tribal" and "J" to "N" Classes on one hand, and in the "O" to "Z" Classes on the other. In all destroyers built prior to the "Tribals," the only large boats built were some relatively few leaders, originally intended to act as flagships for flotilla commanders. Aside from this interesting change in policy, British destroyer development has been fairly gradual and continuous since the "Admiralty "V" and "W" designs of the last war.

#### SUBMARINES

British submarines have developed into three standard sizes: The oceanpatrol, large *Triton's*, the medium sea-going "S" Class, and the small, coastal units of the *Unity* Class. Most of the older effective units remaining from pre-war building programs fall into the same general category as the *Triton* and her sisters. Other units are odd numbers, not likely to be retained for any length of time on the active list.

#### MINOR COMBATANT TYPES


As in the last war, enemy action against Britain's vital sea lanes of communications has called into existence a tremendous number of mass-produced escort and patrol vessels, to supplement the overworked destroyer and cruiser force. Among the ocean-going types, four categories predominate: the corvette, the frigate, the destroyer escort, and the sloop. Of these, the corvette and frigate types are numerically the strongest and individually the weakest from a surface ship action point of view, as their primary mission was antisubmarine screening. The destroyer escort is essentially a smaller and cheaper version of the fleet destroyer, capable of offensive action against enemy coastal convoys and forces. All three of the above types are definitely war emergency designs; many of them will probably be disposed of, as were their predecessors of 1915-18, after the return of peace. The sloop, now developed into a compact and handy patrol and escort vessel with a formidable gun armament, is a more permanent type and will. find useful employment in relieving larger warships of peacetime police duties on distant stations. Though primarily intended for neutralizing enemy and controlling friendly mining operations, the mine sweeper has developed into a smaller edition of the sloop, and has proven a very useful escort and patrol ship in addition to her other duties.


The world's first genuine aircraft carrier. Converted from a half finished liner in 1918. Now used for training.



Sisters of the USS LONG ISLAND and CHARGER. BITER has an "island" similar to the BATTLER Class.




The earliest British freighter-conversion of this war
